Each year road traffic crashes cause:

1.19M deaths
50M injuries

The leading cause of death for 5- to 29-year-olds

>90% of deaths

occur in lowand middleincome countries

Lack of government investment

Barriers

Lack of capacity, funding, and political will to implement

Very few countries with vehicle safety standards




Trends in Road Safety Outcome and Speeding Data Latin American Cities





2024 speeding rounds and change in mortality from 2019-2023



Key trends

- We see upward trends in road traffic mortality in most cities in Latin America.
- These trends are mostly driven by increasing deaths in motorcyclists.
- Overall, there seems to be strong relationship between driving over the recommended safe speeds and motorcycle speeding with mortality.



- For analyses, focus more on driving over the WHO* recommended speeds and less on speeding prevalence.
- Implement a maximum speed limit in line with global recommendations.
- Increase enforcement of speed limits, focusing on motorcycles, and advocate for lower speed limits and better infrastructure to match recommended safe speeds.

*50 kph in all urban areas and 30 kph in urban areas where this is a planned mix of motorized and non-motorized traffic
