## Article 5.3

WHO Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (WHO FCTC)

 "in setting and implementing their public health policies with respect to tobacco control, Parties shall act to protect these policies from commercial and other vested interests of the tobacco industry"

### Principles

I There is a fundamental and irreconcilable conflict between the tobacco industry's interests and public health policy interests.

2

Parties, when dealing with the tobacco industry or those working to further its interests, should be accountable and transparent.

3

Parties should require the tobacco industry and those working to further its interests to operate and act in a manner that is accountable and transparent.

4

Because their products are lethal, the tobacco industry should not be granted incentives to establish or run their businesses.

## PROTOCOLS on Interactions with Tobacco Industry

Chile/ Philippines: In absolutely necessary meetings (CSOs) should be summoned to the meeting, and the same should be recorded and made publicly available Russia: interactions should be done in public, and that industry appeals and answers should be on the official websites of state authorities and local governments.

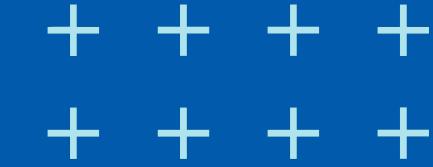
UK: HM Revenue and Customs publishes online the details of its meetings with the industry

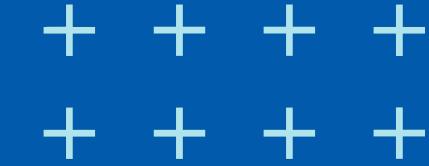

# Preventing Revolving Doors

Specific Provisions from Codes of Conduct or practices relating to avoiding conflicts of interest

+ + + + + + + Panama: Commission Members must not have worked for the industry in the previous 3 years, nor may they work 3 years after appointment

Uganda: A person who has engaged in any occupational activity in <(2) years is not allowed to hold a position that has a bearing on...

Philippines: require applicants to declare any occupational activity with..

Kosovo: disallow hiring if formerly engaged with ..



# Avoiding Conflicts of Interest at COP

"Parties should not nominate any persons employed by the tobacco industry or any entity working to further its interests to serve on delegations to meetings of the COP, its subsidiary bodies or any other bodies..."

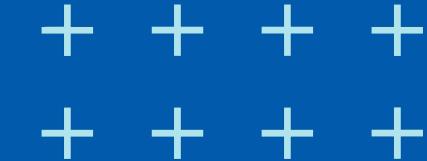

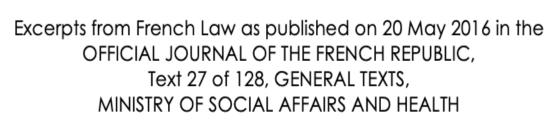

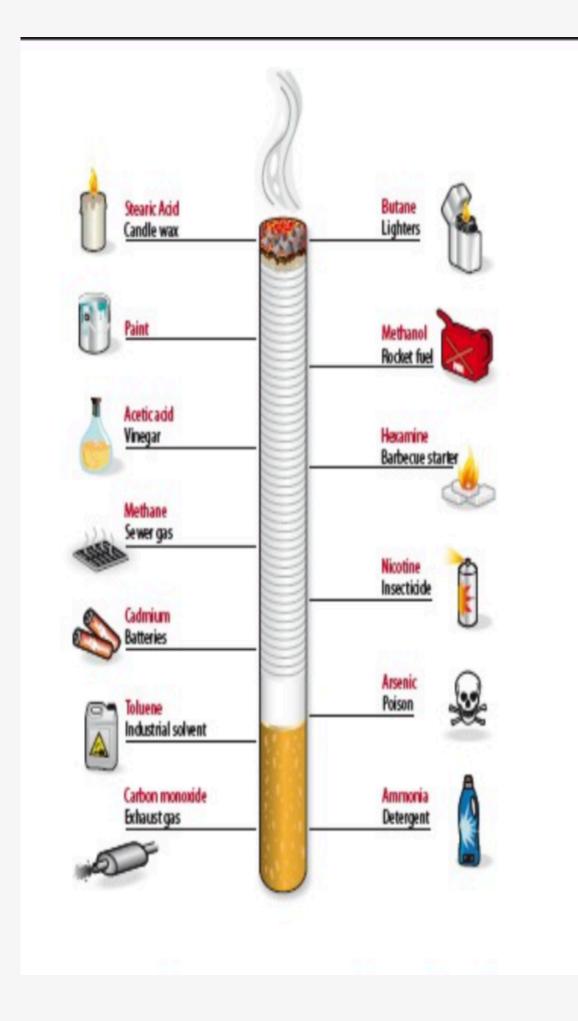
Ordinance No. 2016-623 of 19 May 2016 transposing Directive 2014/40 / EU on manufacturing, presentation and sale of tobacco products and related products

XXX

Art. L. 3512-7. - I. - Manufacturers, importers and distributors of tobacco products, as well as companies, professional organizations or associations representing them, submit a report each year to the Minister of Health detailing all the expenses related to activities influence or representation of interests.

II. – The following are considered expenses related to activities of influence or representation of interests:

- 1. The remuneration of personnel employed in whole or in part to exercise influence or interest representation activities;
- 2. Purchases of services from consulting firms in influential or interest representation activities;
- 3. Benefits in kind or in cash, in any form whatsoever, directly or indirectly, the value of which exceeds 10 €, provided to:
  - a. Members of the Government;
  - Members of ministerial offices or collaborators of the President of the Republic;
  - c. Collaborators of the President of the National Assembly or the President of the Senate;
  - d. Parliamentarians;
  - e. Persons entrusted with a public service mission which their mission or the nature of their function calls for taking or preparing the decisions and opinions of the public authorities relating to tobacco products;
  - f. Experts, natural or legal persons, appointed by agreement with a public person, to advise on behalf of a public person whose mission it is to take or prepare the decisions and opinions of the authorities public information on tobacco products.



# Mexico: Publicly available information

"companies producing, importing or trading tobacco products to release information concerning the content of their products to the Ministry of Health, inc. ingredients and emissions, and their health effects, ....to make them available to the general population."

Upon request, the public can access details of meeting



### 6 Denormalize CSR

Denormalize and, to the extent possible, regulate activities described as "socially responsible" by the tobacco industry.

### CSR BAN

63 countries have a comprehensive ban on tobacco advertising and sponsorships including so-called CSR Activities

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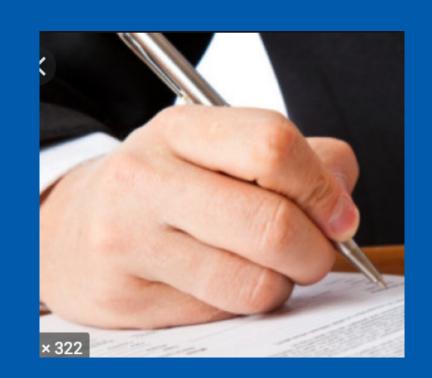

# Disallow giving preferential treatment

Instances reported

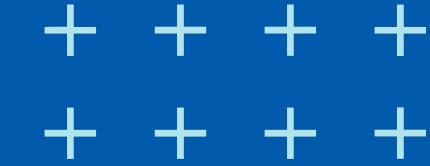
General: Brazil, Burkina Faso\* Kosovo\* New Zealand, Uganda\* Norway: adopted ethical standards to prevent the Government Pension Fund from investing in tobacco companies.) US, UK: Diplomatic missions cannot be used to promote tobacco in foreign countries. Australia, Singapore, CPTPP countries: deprive tobacco companies the benefit of investor-state remedy
