Tobacco consumption remains a significant public health challenge in Latin American countries, contributing to a substantial burden of disease and economic cost. In response, governments across the region have been exploring various policy measures to reduce tobacco consumption, with tobacco taxation emerging as the most effective, yet most underutilized, strategies. This workshop aims to bring together policymakers from finance and health sectors to discuss and evaluate the role of tobacco taxes in reducing consumption, improving health outcomes, and mobilizing revenue.

The workshop will provide a platform for sharing experiences, best practices, and evidence-based research on tobacco taxation. Participants will engage in in-depth discussions on the economic, social, and health impacts of tobacco taxes, as well as the challenges and opportunities for implementing effective tax policies in different Latin American contexts. Through facilitating dialogue and knowledge exchange, the workshop seeks to foster regional cooperation and support the development of comprehensive tobacco taxation policies that can lead to sustainable improvements in public health.

OBJECTIVES

Build capacity in the ministries of health and finance of selected Latin American countries in the support, design, administration, and implementation of effective tobacco taxes, through the exchange of experiences and the use of evidence and simulation tools.

Create a space for policymakers, public health professionals, and other stakeholders to share experiences, best practices, and innovative approaches to implementing and optimizing tobacco tax policies in various Latin American contexts.

Collaboratively identify challenges and opportunities and create actionable roadmaps for advancing national tobacco tax policies.
